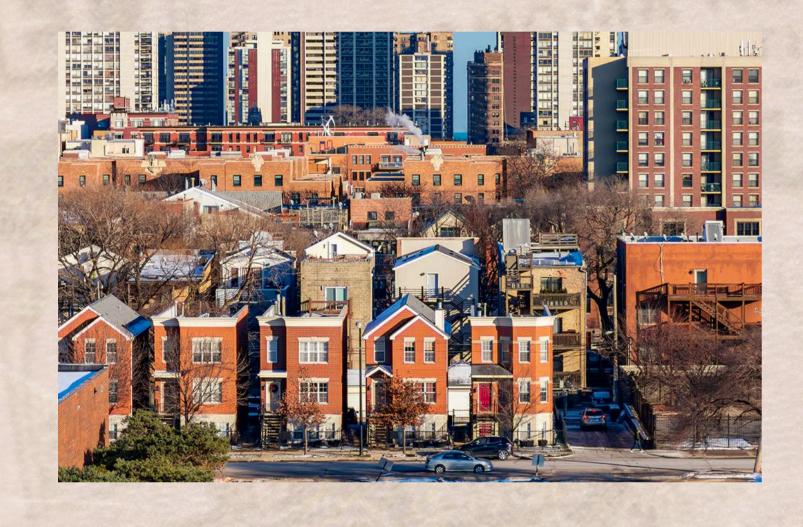

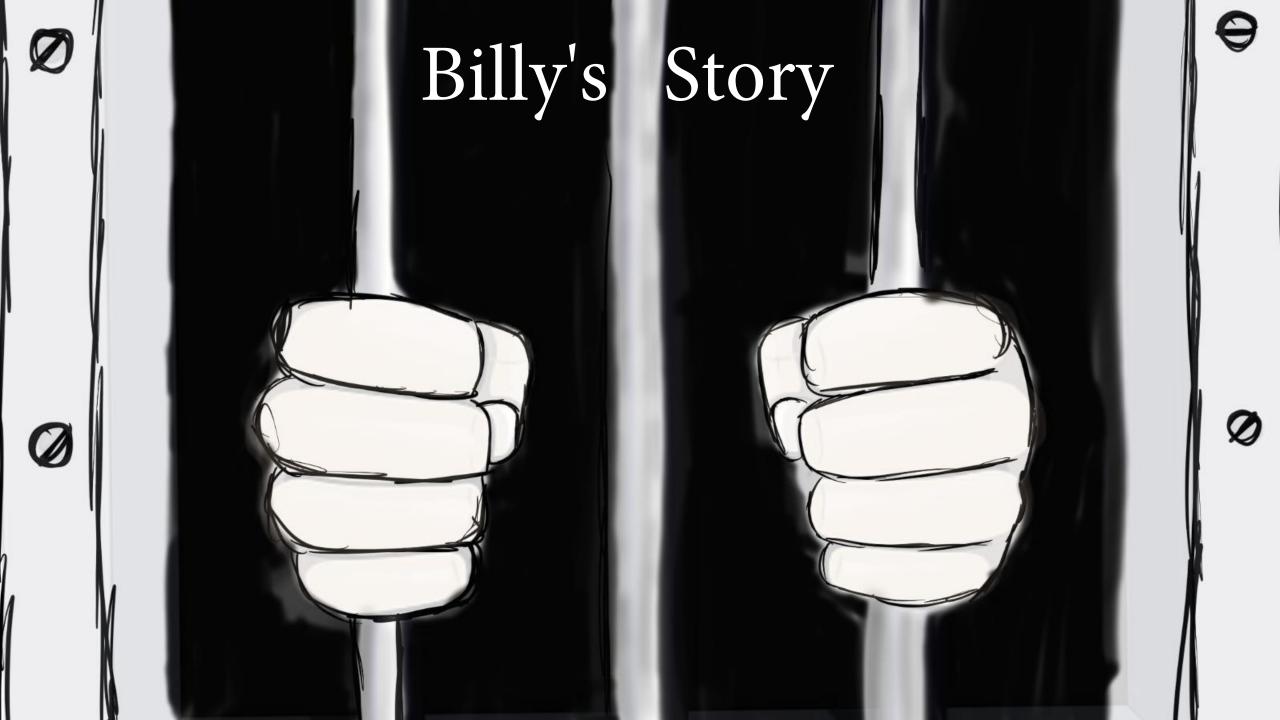

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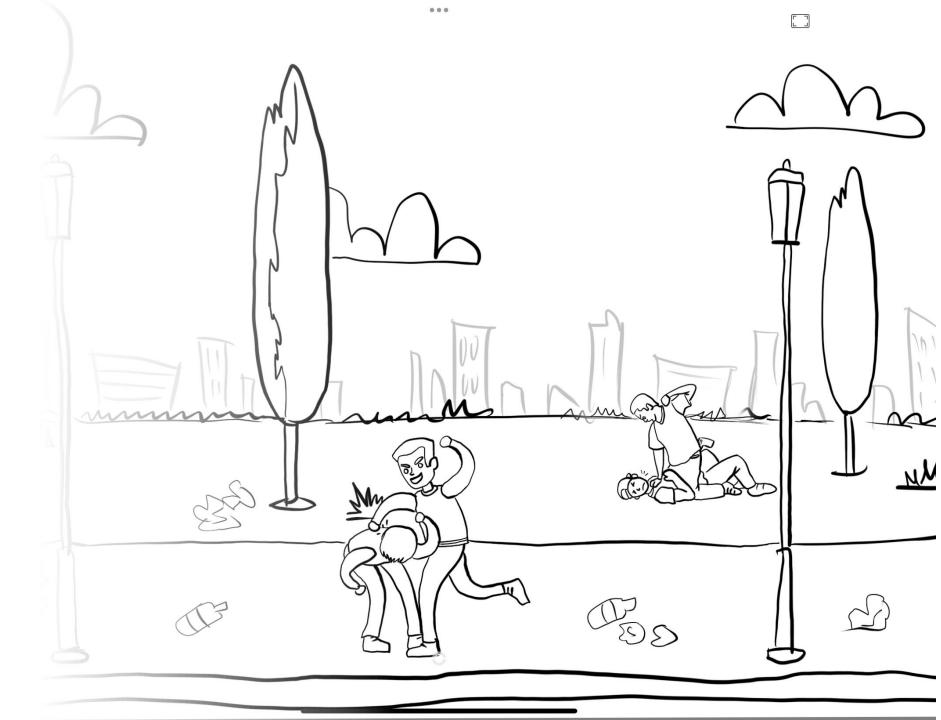

The purpose of this zine is to show how everyone makes mistakes. People of all kinds can sent to prison for doing something dumb. The most important part is what you do after being put in a bad place.



Gage, Gage, and Vincenzo have interviewed for some stories from two formerly incarcerated people to shed some light on this predicament.

Stacy's Experience Before Prison

Stacy says he wasn't the typical person you see going to prison. He grew up in a nice farm family with no home issues. He went to college and had no problem finding work. Stacy considered himself "different than criminals" in his life before prison. He learned that little bad decisions over time can lead to some really big consequences. Stacy now believes that if you're not living out your purpose that God led you to do it will get you in trouble. "if you don't do something good, You will do something bad". This is one of the reasons Stacy spent his time incarcerated writing.

James 4:6, which states, "God resists the proud, but gives grace to the humble".



Fred's Experience Before Prison

In high school, Fred was an A/B student. He was on homecoming court and the senior class president. He was also an athlete in three sports. After graduating he went on to the University of Nebraska Lincoln and received a degree in Communication studies.

Fred grew up with his dad being the biggest contributor, as his parents divorced when he was six. His dad later remarried at nine. He grew up in a broken family environment where he experienced various kinds of abuse. He never realized how much the abuse affected him, until prison, when he was forced to deal with them. He grew up in North Omaha around drugs and violence but stayed away from it.

Stacy's Transition

Stacy was not in prison for long, only being there for 3 years. He mentioned in prison that there's a heavy "us versus them" mindset. It helped Stacy a lot when he got out that he never succumbed to the institutional mindset. The effects of prison were still wearing him down despite his mental fortitude. While incarcerated he returned to college at Metro. Stacy wrote 4 books, 2 movie screenplays, and 1 TV series. Stacy also plugged in resources that helps people find jobs and confidence. He found a program that paid him to go to school, he got an internship, and he helped build medical devices. He has a book coming out and a business startup along with it. His transition was a lot more positive than what other inmates were and he credits that to his mindset he kept despite the circumstances.



Fred's Transition

Fred's transition started with healing. Fred took various classes while inside prison. He did Bible Study and went to counseling in order to help him recover from his childhood trauma and imprisonment. Fred worked at a couple factories before his incarceration, but during his transition he overhauled a data system at a large non-profit organization helping it grow from 1 million to 4 million dollars a year.



When he left prison, he realized the amount of work he needed to do on himself due to his trauma. He got out of a toxic relationship, which made him realize he needed to prioritize himself and accomplish his goals.

Stacy's Story About Being a Father

Stacy has two children, a 21 year old son and an 18 year old daughter. These adults have been disconnected from Stacy for a while, and exerting his influence as their parent would be too overbearing. "They're old enough to decide on their own".



After his wife left with the kids and his bout with prison, he has "the peace that I know God's taking care of [them]". He's still working on improving himself so that his kids can find him a reliable family member.

Fred's Story About Being a Father

Fred hasn't seen his son since we was incarcerated 12 years ago. He wants to let go of the prison mindset in his head before he reconnects to avoid as much pain between the two as possible. Even after going through courses and doing bouts of self reflection he still can't bring himself to see his son. Another barrier is that he would have to reconnect with his ex-wife. "Like what is my ex wife telling my son, her?" The disconnect between Fred and his family grows every day.



Conclusion

Stacy and Fred have gone through many trials and tribulations to get their lives back together and to reconnect to what they had before being incarcerated. Along the way they have learned virtues such as belief, vigor, hope, and grit. We should care about Stacy and Fred's stories because they show us that anybody can do wrong and be incarcerated. The most important part is to not lose your way and to keep moving your life in a positive direction, no matter what happens.

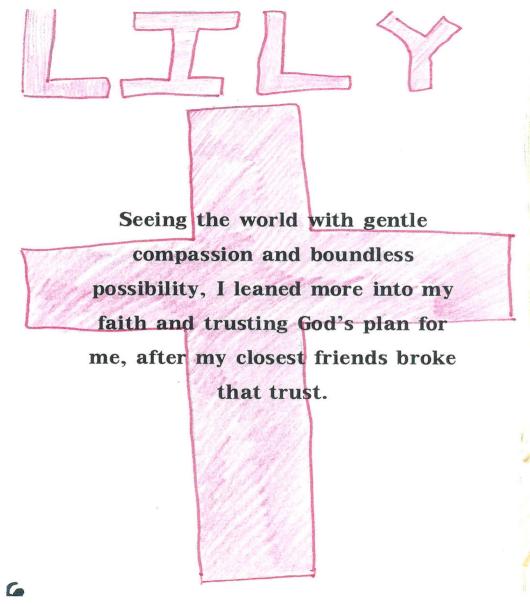

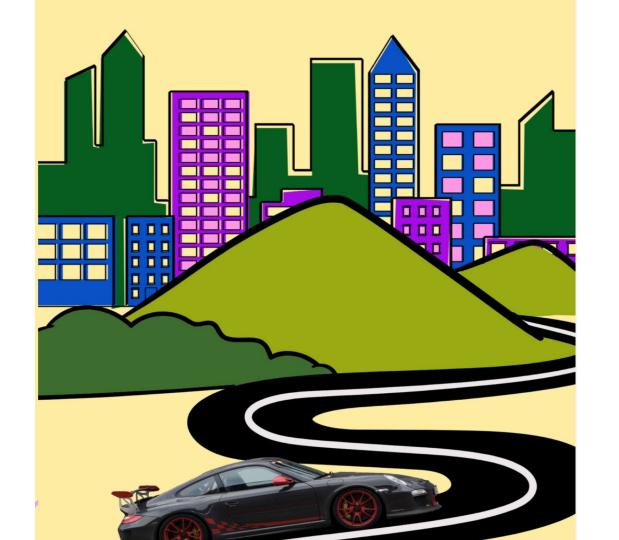
Im the front left tire, my first experience with the road was a very smooth ride, but later I found out it could get rough real fast, with one wrong turn, it could all come to an end.

BACK RIGHT TIRE STORY

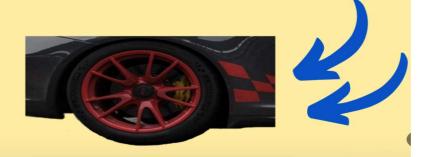

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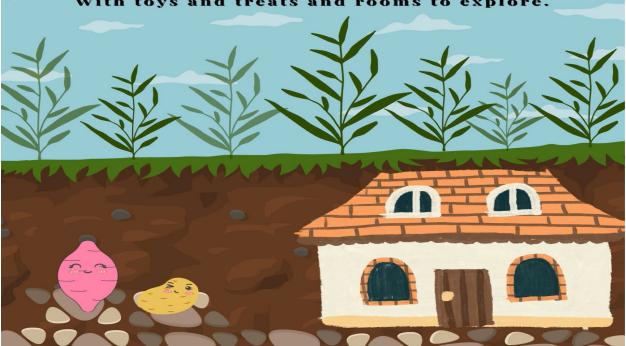

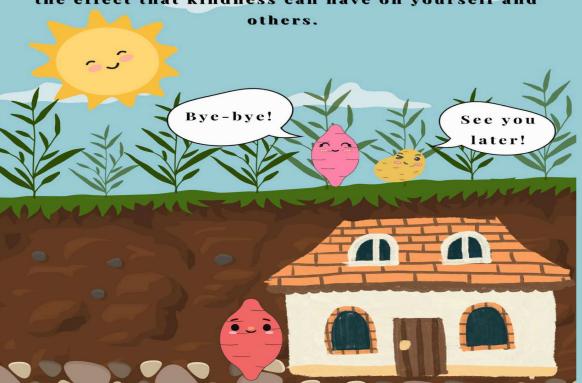
Sweetie and BB want you to know that nobody's perfect, no matter how old! Everyone's learning and everyone grows, just like the trees and even your toes.
